ASEM-wide Youth Survey: Thoughts and Perceptions on Quality Education

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About ARC6

Since its establishment in 2008, the ASEF Rectors' Conference and Students' Forum (ARC) has been a multi-stakeholder dialogue platform for university leaders, policy makers and education practitioners, business representatives and students to discuss higher education issues and shape the education landscape in Asia and Europe.

ARC is recognised as the Official Dialogue Partner of the ASEM Education Ministers Meeting (ASEM ME). Its results, including policy recommendations and research, feed into the preparation of ASEM MEs, which ARC rectors and student representatives are invited to attend. Moreover, as part of the Global Action Programme on Education for Sustainable Development (GAP), ARC contributes to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). ARC takes place on a biennial basis alternating between Asia and Europe. It addresses 3 areas in higher education: 1) quality and inclusive education, 2) university governance, and 3) university-business partnerships. To date, over 650 university leaders representing 226 universities from 51 Asian and European countries have participated in the conferences.

The 6th edition of the ASEF Rectors' Conference and Students' Forum (ARC6) will take place on 9-13 October 2017 in Singapore. ARC6 will focus on "Future-ready Universities and Graduates: Quality Education Beyond the Horizon".

Snapshot of the ASEM-wide survey

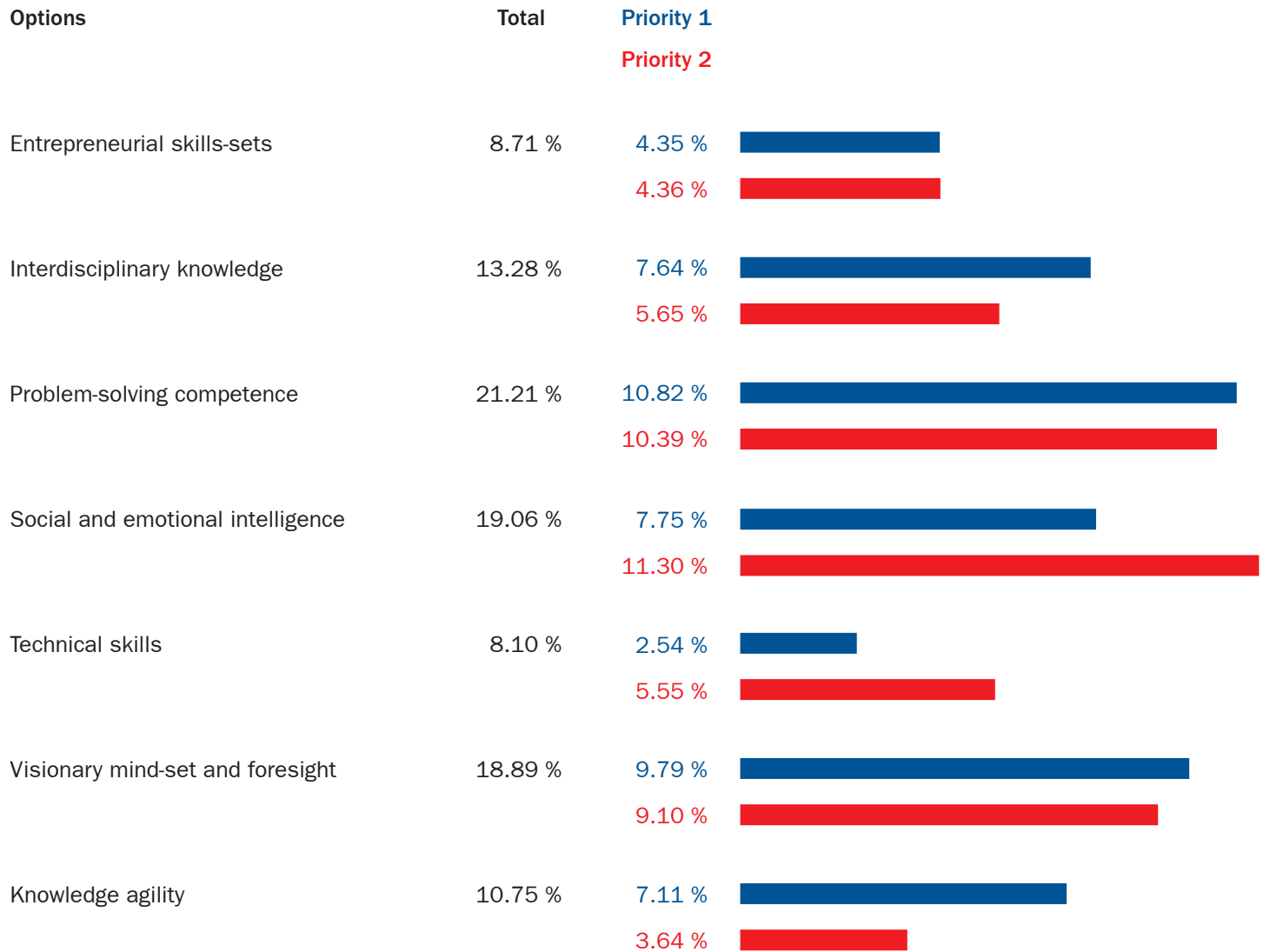
ASEF launched an Open Call for Applications across Asia and Europe in June 2017 (15 June to 16 July 2017). 3,817 students between 18 and 30 years old applied to be part of the forum, where they will discuss the needs, demands and expectations of future-ready universities and graduates; and share their thoughts on how both institutions and individuals can continuously evaluate and adapt their approach to disruptive times. In an effort to recognise the 3,817 youth voices, ASEF has captured their perceptions on future-ready universities and what the term successful higher education means to them in a survey. This survey was a mandatory part of the ARC6 Open Call for Application.

Snapshots of the outcomes can be found in this booklet and will be shared at ARC6 as well as with the ASEM Leaders. Here are some key facts: 86,9% of the respondents were from Asian ASEM countries, while 13,1% came from European ASEM countries. This difference is a reflection of the population size between the two regions. 54,2% of the respondents were female and 45,8% male. The respondents had diverse academic backgrounds: 66,8% were undergraduate students, 26,5% were graduate students, 5,1% were doctoral students, and 1,6% were undertaking a diploma/polytechnic degree.

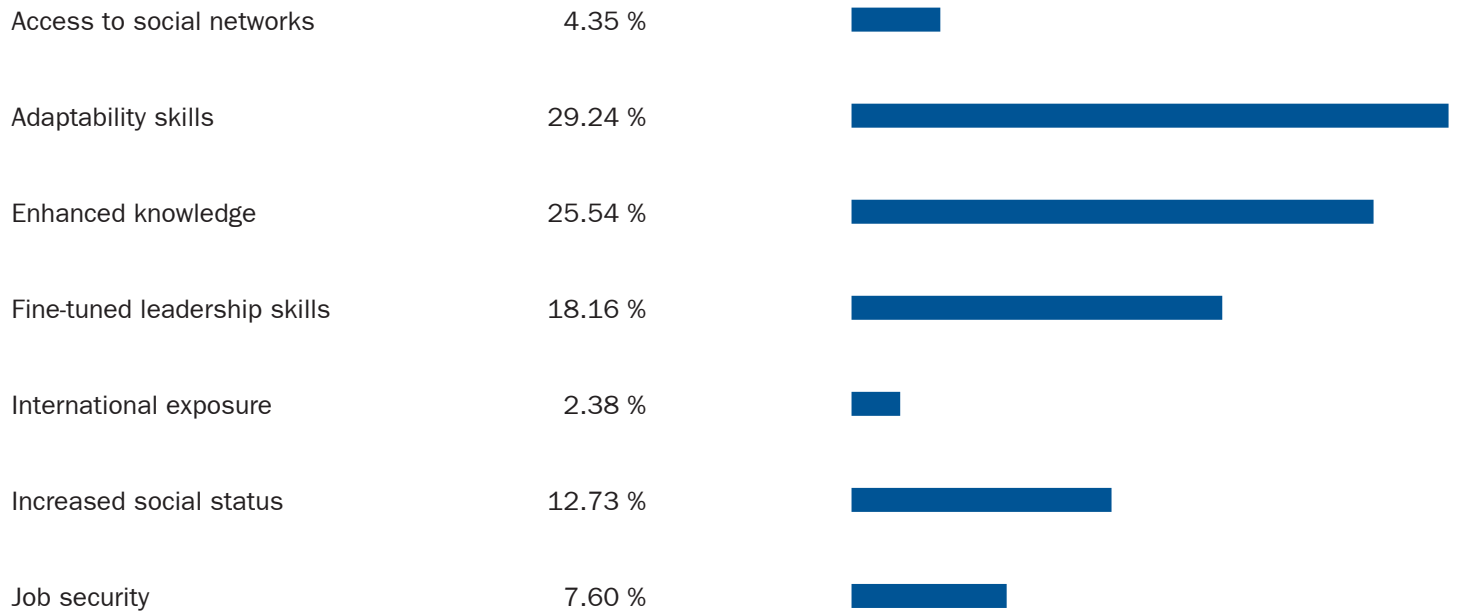
You are the Rector of a university that currently develops a 5 year strategic plan on quality education. What strategic decisions would you put on top of your priorities? Select 2 focus areas:

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MEASUREMENT TOOLS & TANGRAM

The ARC6 design combines 2 components: measuring tools as used across various academic disciplines and tangram puzzle pieces. The measuring tools portray methodical calculations while the tangrams portray creativity and disruption. The contrasting use of these elements depicts two divergent views of quality education: 1) that quality education can be measured through fixed parameters, and 2) that quality education is a process with outcomes that go beyond mere assessment tools. Historically, tangrams were invented in China and then taken to Europe by sea voyagers in the early 19th century. This resonates with the role of ARC in promoting intellectual, people-to-people exchanges between Asia and Europe.
